NEWS

I welcome the fall days of lower temperatures and less humidity so we can be outside enjoying the natural neighborhood beauty and wonderful neighbors. And of



course, we look forward to the creativity of holiday decorations especially Halloween and Christmas. Some of my favorite events are Halloween trick or treaters traversing our streets and the many decorated chariots (golf carts), Luminary Night (2nd Saturday in December) sponsored by the Women's Club; and the associated Luminary Christmas Cart Parade. At Halloween you can always find our house with the

10' three headed dragon standing guard in the front yard.

GCS Police Community Meeting - I want to thank the GCS police (Chief Guzman and Commander Hines) for sponsoring a Magnolia Point Community meeting to explain what they do for us, discuss local crime statistics, and answer our questions. MPCA has a formal agreement with the GCS police to provide daily patrols and to enforce all city, county, and state laws on our private roads. Their discussion of crime statistics should reassure all of us that we live in the safest community in the area.

Corner Constancia & Borden & Magnolia **Point Boulevard** – With the GCS Electric upgrade project the electric company added large transformer boxes throughout the community. The transformer box at this corner and along with overgrown bushes, impaired driver's ability to see traffic incoming from the gatehouse. The City was unwilling to move the box due to the significant costs. We hired a traffic engineer to look at the situation and provide a recommendation. Based on the recommendation, the board has approved the following expenditures and hired a contractor but is awaiting work to start. The City has agreed to reimburse us for the items specifically associated with sight problems. In the next few months, we will be adding a convex mirror at the corner, moving the stop lines for better sight, adding gore area stripping to keep traffic in the middle of the road. In addition, we decided to update the road stripping in the entire entrance area to be compliant with the traffic engineers 2021 traffic study this will make the project larger, so we were able to get competitive best cost bids.

The Landscaping & Irrigation committee has been very helpful, removing sight line hedges, trimming back overgrown shrubs, and adding plants to improve the appearance of that area. Interestingly, we thought the landscaping in front of the Exit Realty building was owned by them, but in our research, we found the Association owns most of that area and will begin to maintain it going forward.

2023 Operating & Reserve Budget — Currently the board is focused on establishing the 2023 Operating and Reserve budgets. With inflationary pressures resulting in increasing costs of services and contracts we expect the Operating Fund requirements to increase. Additional, due to the age of our infrastructure (roads, drainage, streetlights, gates, etc.), we need to increase Reserve Funding to accommodate needed updates. A significant portion of MPCA infrastructure was built in the 1980s and 1990s and is 20-30 years old and in need of maintenance, repair, or replacement.

We will approve the 2023 budgets at the November board/budget meeting. A preliminary budget will be made available to the residents for their review and comment prior to November. Our HOA fees are some of the lowest in the Jacksonville area and with prudent management we can expect that to continue. Each month financial statements and an analytic report are published on the MPCA website at Finance Reports for your information and to increase transparency.

The board is considering hiring a debt collection firm to recover delinquent owner accounts and rules enforcement penalty payments. Delinquent resident payments can be sizable and put a burden on responsible residents to pay more. The firm being considered recovers our payments and adds their recovery fee on top. This process is better for the Association, other firms typically subtract their fee out of the recovered amounts.

Board Elections – There are three Board of Directors positions up for election February 2023. Service on the Board can be challenging yet rewarding and I urge all our owners to consider volunteering for this important role. To run for the Board of Directors, you must be a resident in good standing. If you want MPCA to reflect your views more closely, you need to run for the Board, or encourage likeminded residents to run for the Board, or volunteer for the working committees, or at a minimum vote. If you can't volunteer, due to time constraints, communicate your concerns via the Members Forum or your Block Captain.

This month we feature the hands-on approach of Kim Schlosser, who puts her woodworking skills and sweat-equity into the living spaces of a property notable as an original Magnolia 'Florida Yard'.

How long have you lived at Magnolia Point? Since 2016.

What have you done to the interior since you've been here?


In the kitchen we fabricated two upper cabinets, closed the open soffit area above remaining cabinets. We stripped and repainted all upper and lower cabinets, relocated the microwave, resized the cabinet over stove and installed a new cafe exhaust hood and stainless steel backsplash. We closed the open soffit area over the remaining cabinets and painted it all.

In a corner of the dining room where there were just three recessed bookshelves, I fabricated and installed a Coffee Hutch.

In the master bedroom, I repurposed a curio cabinet as a book case and TV/Dresser.







In the master bath, I fabricated a sliding 'barn' door to replace a curtain on a rod.

Tell us about the skills you've brought to bear on this work.

Tools that I use for my projects include an 8" circular saw, a jig saw, a basic miter saw, a Kreg pocket hole jig, two different sanders, a cordless drill, two plastic saw horses, a folding portable workbench and a long aluminum level that I use to get good rip cuts with the circular saw. Of all things I've learned, the most important is: 'measure three times not twice'.

What do you like best about what you've done?

The best was also the biggest expense: our new flooring and we love the look! But I can't decide on the rest of the projects: I like them all!

Which room(s) did you spend the most time as a kid?

My parents remodeled a small church and I shared a bedroom with my three sisters (it had been the library). I loved to read and craft in that room.

Does your interior work for specific uses: entertainment, work, hobby?


Yes, all of these.

Do you have any household projects in the 'planning' or 'dream' stage?


We are currently installing a pool and outdoor kitchen.

Kayli is 15 yrs. old, a Sophomore at Clay High School. She has a 3.73 GPA, A/B Honor Roll, and performed 90 hours of community service last

school year. Her favorite class is Chorus. As a Freshman she was selected for Chorus Honors. For her

Sophomore year she has been appointed as the Section Leader for Sopranos. "As a Soprano Section Leader, I have the opportunity to mentor my peers as we prepare for recitals and special events. I get to take what others have taught me and pay it forward."

Music is her passion. She began singing at 10. Last month she experienced her first opportunity in a recording studio. The sound engineer said, "I have to remind myself she's 15. She has the voice and control of someone who does this for a career."

Kayli also began decorating cakes at 10 yrs. old. She taught herself by watching YouTube videos. She has a full book of business with family and friends, usually booking out 4-6 weeks. She recently made a wedding cake of which the owners of the venue said, "We see a lot of cakes and many from high end bakeries and hers was every bit as professional as theirs."

Kayli is very active in our church and youth group. She enjoys volleyball and spending time with friends at the lake and shopping.

At her next recital she will perform Adele, One and Only, then record it in the studio.

"I'm so proud of her cake decorating, vocal abilities, grades, work ethic, but I'm most proud of her heart and compassion toward others." Marlene says. She



recalls an incident from when Kayli was 7: "She wanted a large, expensive Lego set. It wasn't in my budget, but I got it for her. I hoped that it would mean as much to her as it did to me. She was very happy to get it. But when she told me she'd given it away to a friend, unopened, having never used it, I was *livid*, and making that clear to her brought

her to tears. "But Mom, she's never had a Lego set! I didn't want you to buy me another one! I just wanted to give her something she's never had, and she really loves it!"

"Then and there my young daughter demonstrated that it's not what you get but what you give that blesses you with deep gratification. Kayli often makes me want to be a better person."

To that, Kayli adds being a better singer.

"It's all I want to do," she said while posing with the assignment she aced for this issue, the Magnolia-themed cake that graces our cover. She speaks glowingly of her voice coach, Edwin Rivera of Wehner's School of the Arts, in Middleburg. "He teaches me a lot about music theory. He believes in my ability and pushes me past what I think I can do. I have my eyes set on Berkley School of Music and Edwin is helping me prepare."











At the corner of Medinah Lane and Maidstone Court is a settlement unique within Magnolia Point, a refuge created, nurtured and protected by the West family. And the State of Florida: a thriving community of 6,

sometimes 8 Gopher turtles at any given time.

"We've had the tortoises in our yard for almost 20 years," Shelli West says, who lives with her husband Jon and two sons at 3610 Maidstone. "They moved in right after we had our front yard landscaped with Fakahatchee ('Fountain') grass in our front yard. They like the sandy soil in this part of the neighborhood." The Gopher tortoise burrow is from 6 to 8 feet deep.

The tortoises are self-sufficient: "They eat the grasses around their burrows, the bay berries that fall on the driveway, and the dates from our royal palms."

"We once saw a female tortoise dropping eggs in our

yard and covering them with dirt. We had to fence that area off for 90 days so we didn't disturb them. They hatched on their own and were on their way. We got to see and hold a few of them. They were so cute."

Sadly, the odds are not good: due to predation, a female can be expected to raise only *one* successful clutch every *ten* years. Still, the gopher tortoise gives so much back: over **350** other species thrive in the burrows the tortoises leave behind.

"Our cat Ferry liked to stare over a smaller tortoises den and tap its shell with her paw as if to say, 'can you come out and play?""

After so many years, the tortoises are part of the West family, and a familiar stop for folks walking by and golfers coming or going. "We get many visitors on golf carts that stop by and say, 'can we visit your turtles?' One time we saw they had left Skittles near their dens."

Obviously not part of their diet.

However, like most families, there can be disagreements. "They get territorial and my husband Jon has to separate them when they fight. They ram each other, one trying to knock the other one over on its back," Shelli says.

If you're thinking you might like to host a colony, keep in mind that a permit is required to move a turtle, and this can cost from \$1,000 to \$2,000 and as high as \$6,000.

Be kind: to report a sighting, or a sick, distressed, dead or injured turtle, contact FWC.

Roy and Leslie Gulick built and have lived in their

beautiful home at 1727 Colonial Drive for 27 years. Roy mentioned that theirs was the first home in his immediate area and that the property was surrounded by woods. He also explains that he and Leslie consider their yard and gardens to be a "work in progress".

The Gulicks front gardens are symmetric in design and somewhat formal using plants often found in our area. The color scheme is primarily monochromatic using yellow as the accent flower color with touches of pink and orange in flower baskets and bowls. The front yard is framed by two large palms: a Pindo (Butia) near the road and a Silvester Date set further back closer to the house on each side of the front of the property.

The side and back gardens are more natural and casual with a touch of whimsy. The Ligustrum

shrubs have been up-limbed to resemble trees



along the back brick patio and are shaped in a wavelike pattern. There is a flower pot with blue toenail polished feet as it's base and a few tropical accent plants such as the large Philodendron, Plumeria plant and palms in pots.


There are paths meandering through a shaded woodland area, a small fish pond complete with goldfish and a

How long have you lived at Magnolia Point? Since September 11, 2020.

Have you reworked an outdoor space that was here, or was this a new build?

This was an entire brand new construction plan from the beginning to the end.

What do you like best about your 'OutSide'?

The versatility, quietness, 'one of a kind', and privacy.

Do you entertain in this space?

We've enjoyed early morning breakfasts by the pool, family barbecues and lunch outings and evening dinners with our Magnolia guests.

Do the seasons obviously limit your use, or do you adapt to them?

We have designed our property and placed several remote controls in place to allow it to be enjoyed all year round.

Were there any engineering obstacles, drainage, logistics, permitting, etc., that you overcame, or know of, that challenged the project.

It took extensive leveling, fill, concrete, electrical and plumbing work, fencing, river rock, maple mulch, various tropical plants including palms, and a specialized fountain. We installed Disney resort lighting, controlled remotely by an iPad, with 65 colors and schemes, and synced to music if we like. And yes, permitting was a challenge, between HOA and the city, but we kept at it.







What are you particularly proud of?

We're proud of the entire project.

What might you want to change in your outdoor space?

There's more in store. Stay tuned!

What, if any, are the maintenance issues? How do you manage this?

Maintance is a challenge, and finding competent landscape contractors that pay attention to detail doesn't seem possible today. Thus, our property is maintained by the family.

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LADIES 18 HOLE GOLF LEAGUE




On **September 22** we were scheduled to play an Individual Point Quota game. Unfortunately, it was canceled due to lack of participation.
