2023 - BUDGETING YOUR MONEY

It is time to consider the use of your money again. And it is time to determine the amount of the 2023 assessments. Each year, near the end of summer, we assemble information and estimate appropriate and required spending for the upcoming year. The proposed Budget has been submitted to the Board of Directors (Board), should already be in your hands, and is now pending approval by the Board at the November 14th, 6:30pm Board Meeting. After approval the budget will be posted to the financial section of the Magnolia Point website, www.magpt.com.

My father once told me "Money isn't everything but it is way out in front of whatever comes second." I know that money cannot buy happiness but without enough it becomes very hard to be happy. It is truly your money that we will spend and the Board wishes to be very transparent in allowing you to be involved in the decisions.

In the event that you have not given our Home Association your current email address and permission to communicate with you using that, I suggest that you contact our Community Association Manager (CAM), Mary Marciano, at 904-940-1002, extension 323, and register for an account on our website. That will keep you better informed and help to prevent unnecessary mail spending.

We have managed to not increase the assessments for a few years, but this year we are recommending a budget with a ten percent increase in quarterly fees for each homeowner. For the majority of homeowners', the quarterly fee, beginning January 1st of 2023, will increase from \$345.14 to \$379.65. The total increase would be \$133,000. As we all know, inflation has been quite high this year, and we must recognize that our projected spending increase also. Our Reserve Fund transfers from our Operating Fund, which primarily encompasses our infrastructure such as our roads, the lighting, ponds and stormwater drainage systems, and major common property tree removal etc. is expected to consume about 45% of the increase, and our operating expenditures are expected to comprise the remaining 55%. With transfers of funds to the Reserve Fund from the Operating Fund, we are maintaining a level of funding recommended by our last Reserve Fund study. This Fund was decimated by the effects of hurricane Erma a few years ago, and since then we have rebuilt it. We are expecting to have an even more thorough study completed early next year.

As noted above, you can look at the proposed 2023 budget with the assumptions to see reasonably detailed

information regarding those 2023 increases in the Operating Budget. I will set forth the major 2023 proposed increases.

Primary accounts and amounts to focus on in the 2023 Budget compared to 2022 are:

Assessments Revenue – primarily billed as \$345.14 times 4 quarters (January, April, July, and October) for 967 homesites will be \$379.65 beginning January 1, 2023 if approved.

Replacement Fund Transfers - \$26,000 transferred monthly from the Operating Fund to the Reserve Fund, representing an increase of \$60,000 annually.

General & Administrative - Spending increases of \$12,000 for insurance, management, and communications.

Landscaping and Maintenance - Spending increases of \$20,000 largely for anticipated tree trimming and removal, as well as other landscaping contract cost increases.

Access Control - \$32,000 spending increase largely for guard wage increases to be competitive with the industry standard to have quality guards.

Utilities – Cost increases of \$7,000 for water and electricity.

The opportunities for reduced spending are very limited. One that you know is under discussion with a neighborhood survey is the Tower Park area on the corner of US 17 and Harbor Road. Disposing of this property has the potential for annual savings of about \$30,000.

Looking forward, it would not be unreasonable to expect future assessment increases considering the upcoming Reserve Fund study and ongoing inflation.

I would like to encourage you to be knowledgeable of the financial activity in our community by accessing the Association's financial reports on our web site. And, I thank those of you who are able to attend monthly Board Meetings at the Clubhouse as graciously provided to us by the Rothfels, our resident Club owners and Board member.

I would also like to note that we are always seeking volunteers for Committee and Board positions in our neighborhood. In March three Board members, Larry Francisco, President, Jon Bastress, Vice President, and I, John Lochner, Treasurer, will either vacate our positions on the Board or be up for potential reelection. As in the past, some persons remain in office if it seems replacements are not available, hence I would encourage candidates to step forward as soon as possible.





Turning to the living room, one is drawn immediately to a floor-to-ceiling wall done in a sharp, contemporary shiplap, a theme he is extending throughout the house.

It can be a challenge to find square and level surfaces that match on some of Magnolia's older homes. Travis' fine carpentry skills are remarkable. He showed me complex miters (from the back side, where the tale is really told) that made my eyes hurt. And the walls, nooks and corners that are receiving the gift of this precision dimensional paneling give a museum-grade look.



DO-IT-YOURSELF CABINET REFRESH



Tired of looking at our 1990s warm oak kitchen cabinets, we decided to take a page from our new neighbors who, upon moving in, had their cabinets painted instead of replacing them.

There are a few well known cabinet paints, but one that stuck out was Beyond Paint of 'All-In-One' fame: primer and paint in one, lots of colors, and 'no sanding, vacuuming or dusting'. We were sold.

We chose to lighten up the kitchen and paint the cabinets white, all of them, and that our black and emerald granite would look great against a forest green island. We hoped to be able to paint without removing the cabinet doors, our biggest fear. Spoiler alert: it works for drawer fronts, not the doors. At least there was that.

We cleared out the garage and set up all the utility tables we had. Dixie kiddie cups work great to raise up the doors while on the tables, making it easy to paint the sides as well as the tops. We'd removed all of the cabinet doors, labeling them on the hinges, as we took them down. Four eight-foot tables weren't nearly enough to allow painting all the doors at once. And drying in the garage in August took at least four to five times as long as inside. Each door took two coats of paint on each side, with a couple to several hours to dry in between.



Back inside, we painted from the top of the cabinet frames and bases down to avoid smudging bottom cabinets. We also learned to line our mini paint tray with aluminum foil, allowing us to just toss out of the foil, no tray washing. We also found that wrapping the wet brushes in cling wrap kept the brushes fresh overnight, and avoided that washup chore, as well.

The Beyond Paint product stuck with no issues. Our last task was what to do with the outdated backsplash; we researched stenciling and decided to paint with what we had leftover. We got the stencil from Stencil Revolution, here in Florida, so shipping was speedy. The stencils were a bit of a mess. I did all the whole tiles first (which are far fewer than it looks), stenciling with one blank tile in between to keep from smudging. Then I had to trim a few stencils so I could lay them flat against the tile: I had one for the far left



column of tiles, one for the far right, one for the top row, one for the bottom row, etc.

I used as little paint as possible to keep the 'bleeding' down. I actually lightly loaded a foam roller, and then rolled it on paper towels to leave just a teeny tiny bit of paint on the roller. Still it bled a little, paint not perfectly filled in but I consider this part of the look.

As for paint, I just used the paint I already had. Also, Beyond Paint recommends 30 days to cure for very light cleaning' and 70 days for full curing. So it all takes some patience.


Do you have any household projects in the 'planning' or 'dream' stage?

THE GOOD YARDS




What were the main improvements you'd done to your yard?

We replanted some weedy areas and some rose bushes, but also removed a couple of rose bushes that were blocking some flowers and the view of the water.

What was your first "success" with it?

That the entire yard didn't die the first year or become totally overgrown!



The serenity and the privacy the landscaping provides. I can sit on my back lanai and barely see cars go by on Colonial. I know they cannot see me.

What are your plans or ideas for it?

Maintaining the curtain of privacy the foliage provides.









Where do you buy or find items for plantings? All locally purchased.

Do you maintain your yard and plantings yourself?

My lawn guy trims one shrub on the side of the house and a lawn pest control company provides fertilizer and herbicides. I do all the other trimming of trees and shrubs as needed.

Do you work with a landscaper on design ideas?

No. The vast majority of this work was performed by the previous owners. All I have done is provide the work to maintain or replace as needed.

What advice would you give someone planning (any or all) of the features in your yard?

It doesn't have to be perfect when you plant it.

Just imagine how it will look filled out and taller. Also, a little hand watering during the drier/hotter months is better than replacing a dead shrub or dead grass.

Six years ago I was assistant coach for Special Olympics when I saw the program in danger of going under. When we

looked for volunteers, Bobbe Marion was the first and only one to step up. It has been a learning experience for both of us. She runs the putting (short and long putt) skill along with Marsha Fields.

A little history how we got to Magnolia Point. 7 years ago we were practicing at Cattail Creek which has since been

closed. I contacted Ronna Smith, head of Clay County Special Olympics and she went with me to meet with Trevor and Dineen Rothfels to ask if we could use Magnolia Point and they readily accepted. 


LADIES 9 HOLE GOLF LEAGUE


