

As the holidays are rapidly upon us, I'd like to say thank you to all the neighbors that give of their free time to try to improve the neighborhood.

This year the Architectural Review Committee has grown and been very busy looking over the various renovations and improvements that our residents want to do and thanks to their diligence the community standards are maintained, and we continue to have a community to be proud of.

The Rules Enforcement Committee is busy watching the neighborhood to ensure those same standards are met and issues that could cause the neighborhood to become run down or shabby are corrected before that happens.

Landscape & Irrigation has tackled a number of projects to beautify both the Magnolia Point Boulevard area and the Medinah back gate to enhance everyone's initial impressions of the neighborhood. The group are all talented gardeners and enjoy getting their hands dirty and cleaning up, weeding and replanting some of the smaller areas themselves.

The Roads, Drainage and Waterways Committee is busy trying to maintain the aging infrastructure and helping people that are impacted by drains that become plugged, piping that leak, and roads that need filling or resmoothing. Additionally, sinkholes appear and need to be addressed before they become bigger problems.

The Community Liaison Committee is supposed to be our primary method of communicating with the Country Club. Several situations have impacted our ability to complete that function, but we hope to see the committee reenergized soon.

Access Control is always busy replacing gate crossarms that people somehow seem to not see, and have put forth initiatives to try to improve our safety and the smoothness of entry to the community.

The Block Captain Committee has already shown itself to be extremely valuable in our efforts to get the

word out to residents. Many people seem too busy to read email notices but having Block Captains improves our ability to communicate with residents.

The Communications Committee ensures information that is necessary to inform the residents is sent out and/or available on our website.

The Strategic Planning Committee provided a superb guideline of many of our resident's desires and gave the board a great place to work from to meet those desires and goals.

Lastly, I'd like to give a shoutout to **Helen DiGuardia** who stepped up when we needed and took the lead of a holiday decorating committee and did a magnificent job of building a plan and finding "helpers" to make it happen. Magnolia Point has never looked better for the holidays!

Many people are necessary to meet all the requirements of keeping the neighborhood as the premier place to live in Clay County. If you have any spare time, please consider volunteering to support any of the committees that may interest you and you can be part of the solution!

Speaking of volunteering, the Board of Directors has three members that are completing their two-year terms in the beginning of 2023. Some may apply to return to the board but each of the three seats is open to anyone qualified. Qualifications? 








Jola and Al Greiner have been making Rustic Reindeer for years. All that's needed is a good eye, a steady hand, some power tools, and a creative take on Reindeer anatomy. And some wood. Some scrap firewood will do, but if you have plans to conquer an entire neighborhood, you'll need **lots of it!** 



"Ros Arnold had some big branches down in her back yard she let us harvest," Jola says, "Ed Poucher brought crepe myrtle trimmings that make great reindeer legs & necks but most of the wood was from windfalls on the red nine that Trevor kindly allowed me to drive to, cut up and haul out."

The finished product does display a dizzying array of specially-sized pieces. To Jola this is the fun part, "With lots of branches to choose from and a bit of imagination it's fun to try to use what you have to get a little personality and attitude into the final results."

Plenty of volunteers made
pretty quick work of the 40
critters produced for 2022,
averaging one completed
every 4 minutes! After their
time in the community, all are
promised homes, "The folks
that helped put them together get first pick
after the holidays. It is not recommended to
bring the deer inside your
home. Quite interesting
critters live in dead wood.
They will emerge and go
exploring for moisture as the
wood dries out!"




### "CHAINSAWS WANTED" - Instructions Not Required

The Holiday Decorations Committee is an ad hoc MPCA committee and is independent of the Landscape and Irrigation Committee. Some members volunteer on both. Helen and Andrew DiGuardia, Cindy and Larry Francisco, Patricia Nisely, Albert and Jola Greiner, Paul Werring, Dave and Lori Miller and Suzanne Foster were the "elves to decorate". In addition, we had a crew of reindeer makers at the Greiner home on Dec 12 (see "Reindeer Rock", pages 6-8.)

My goal this year was to create "holiday cheer" throughout Magnolia Point. As my family has not lived here for Christmas, I was starting from scratch. I was blessed to receive notes and have questions answered by **Jola Greiner** as I began, familiarizing me with what decorating happened in past years. My main goal was to create decorations that can be used for years to come. We began with lighting. We lit many of the trees coming in the front gate between the main sign and the guardhouse, with both white and colored

lights. We hung icicle lights on guardhouse gutters, outlined all windows with lights and hung a large wreath on center window of the guardhouse. Inside, we hung lights around center window and added a lit and decorated tabletop tree for some cheer for the guards of all shifts to enjoy.





### JOANNE & ALAN LABEOUF • 3392 OLYMPIC DRIVE



Our *North Pole Village* was started in 2000 when Joanne bought the first piece for me. I'd been admiring the handiwork of 'Department 56', a famous producer of miniature, hand-crafted lighted theme villages and their components. Over the next several years, as the village grew larger than their coffee table could handle, there was a need to make a display to accommodate the growing collection. I designed and built the layered and shelf display to house the village in a way that would allow all buildings to be seen. Each year another section was added somewhere to house the new buildings produced that year until the village area available in the room was maxed out a couple of years ago.

When the village had expanded to a larger size, there was room to incorporate the American Flyer trains that I'd kept from my childhood. The four trains you see date from the 1950s.

The village has **207** buildings, **27** large accessories (elves, santas, sleighs, animals, etc.), and **290** small accessories. It is populated by **22** Santas, but only **9** versions of Mrs. Claus. There are **452** elves: **336** men, **38** women, and **78** children. There are **648** trees, and **37** bushes plus the continuous line of round shrubs around the lower level.

The structure of the display is composed of **40** modular pieces that are put together each year with over **600** bolts and screws. There are **28** back modules

holding **44** shelves. The display has **46** trap doors underneath, and **71** hatches on the tops and sides to allow access to all of the complex wiring to light the buildings and trees, and to set things in motion. Speaking of wiring, there is a total of **2,632 feet of wires**, which is a half mile! The whole display is held up by **60** legs on wheels. There are **33** street lights: gumdrops, snowflakes, and candy canes. **36** reindeer are located throughout the village, including Rudolph of course. There are also **18** polar bears, **11** penguins, and **17** snowmen, as well as various dogs, ducks, and other characters like Mickey and Scrooge McDuck. The snowflakes



gently falling on all the backboards were all hand glued in place, and there are over **10,000** of those. Ask me how I know that!




The group will not play again until Thursday, December 1, Round 2 of Stableford play.
