REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

FEBRUARY 2023

Your Board of Directors have a number of projects in the works to comply with legal requirements and also in response to requests from residents.

There is currently a Reserve Study underway which will determine the amount of funds we are required to have available in case of emergencies or unforeseen contingencies. Past studies have not included our storm water system and left us open to short term assessments that none of us want to have to respond to. We hope to ensure that we will be able to meet our obligations without special assessments, but of course that depends on the cost of the emergency repairs and what amount we have been able to build up. The Strategic Planning Committee last year estimated that we could need more than \$20 million if we were required to replace all the metal drainage pipes in the community! Luckily, most of the drainpipes investigated by our engineer have been concrete which is much less likely to need short term replacement.

A new security study will begin soon to identify areas we need to improve or change to reach the levels of security which residents told us they desire.

Additionally, everyone who drives in the neighborhood knows that our roads are deteriorating as time goes by. To make this situation even worse, the prices for materials and labor have skyrocketed and many companies will not even consider bidding on our jobs because we are too small and they only want the bigger jobs that provide more work and profits. Our previous plans divided the neighborhood into 5 sections (depending on road condition) and we planned to address one section every other year to work through the project. Due to the increased costs, we are leaning towards repaving a section every third year while patching other areas to prevent deterioration from making our roads impassable.

One positive aspect that has helped us keep costs under control has been our strong cadre of volunteers that have stepped up to oversee or carry out projects and saved us large sums of money while improving our neighborhood. Please join me in thanking the volunteers that serve on our various committees and please consider volunteering some of your time to take part in these activities. Not only could you improve our neighborhood but you might also find new friends and enjoyment from participating.

Our Roads, Drainage and Waterway committee is in need of someone to take the lead as Bill Nisley takes a break from his many years of service to the community. You don't have to be a trained engineer to chair the committee but rather be willing to learn and work with others to find reasonable solutions for the problems that emerge. Other committees also gladly accept new volunteers to shoulder part of the labors. Again, it's a great way to meet people, have a positive effect on our neighborhood and also an opportunity to be exposed to the way the HOA works and accomplishes goals.

On Friday, Jan 20th the Landscape and Irrigation Committee held an Arbor Day Celebration at the T Intersection of Magnolia Point Boulevard/Colonial and Constancia and invited the community. A number of residents responded and made the celebration a high point in community involvement. The response was exactly what we would hope neighborhood participation looks like. Well done L&I!

Our annual meeting will take place March 14th at the Clay County Fairgrounds. During February you will receive notice of the meeting and a ballot to vote for this year's board. Three of the current members will complete their two-year terms at this meeting. Please take the time to examine those running for the board to make your choice for who should serve for the next two years. A meet the candidates session will be announced and held prior to the annual meeting. The votes will be tallied at the meeting and the candidates with the top three vote counts will be elected. Immediately following the annual meeting the board will reconvene to choose officers for the next year. Your vote is very important! A quorum (30%) of owners must vote to complete an official election. (One vote per property!) If we don't reach a quorum of owners voting in person or by proxy the vote must be re-conducted. Please vote and try to attend the meeting to ensure your voice is heard.

Remember, if you wish to contact any board member to ask a question or make an input, our telephone numbers and email addresses are available on our website. Ideas and questions can also be made on the Member's Forum where you can also comment on other residents' inputs. Board members really do read the Forum and find it very useful in helping us make decisions to comply with residents' wishes.

REPORTS FROM THE COMMITTEE CHAIRS

FEBRUARY 2023

ACCESS CONTROL

There are two street lights that are need of repair that we are working on. One is at/near 3682 Baltusrol and the other is at/near 1871 Medinah. After troubleshooting by the GCS Electrical Department and our contractor, T&M Electric, it has been determined that there is a break in the electrical lines between the transformers and the light posts at each location. Unfortunately, it seems the repairs for these two lights need to be brought up at the next Board meeting in February to get the work approved. Until then, these street lights will be

inoperative.



The electronic video equipment at the front gate was 8+ years old and was in need of replacing. We had been having video problems with our front gate Network Video Recorder (NVR) and over the summer and two of our five front gate video cameras stopped working. Three of the cameras and NVR were replaced during the

month of December and the last two cameras were replaced in January. This upgrade will significantly

improve the performance of the monitoring capabilities at the front gate.

In January we installed the Flock Safety camera system just inside the front gate. This system is a camera that can read a license plate and would notify local law enforcement of suspicious vehicles. License plates



are the #1 piece of evidence that police request in the case of criminal activity such as home and car breakins. Flock Safety's cameras are entirely self-sufficient; they are solar-powered and send footage via mobile technology to a secure cloud-based network unique to our community.

Some people have asked why we have duplicate cameras at the front gate. That is a good question - the cameras perform different functions. The Flock camera is a proactive system that automatically alerts law enforcement (GCS police) when it detects a vehicle of interest. The video equipment in the gatehouse is a passive system that requires an incident (such as a gate hit) to trigger someone to review the 5 cameras to determine what happened. They are similar but differ in purpose and complement each other.

Also included in my 2023 budget, which was approved at the November Board Meeting, is money to hire an access control consultant. This consultant will analyze our community access control and safety protocols, gate equipment, Securitas procedures and effectiveness, community fencing, etc., and develop an overall access control and safety plan with a recommendation for improvements. So far, I have contacted four different companies and I am in the process of evaluating each of their proposals.

In January we replaced the back exit gate arm and the LED lights for it. If you remember from last month's report, the old gate arm was so severely damaged we could not get the LED lights out of it (which we normally do) and had to order a new set. We received the LED lights, installed them into the new gate arm, and mounted it to the pedestal.

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW

January update from the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). December was a busy month for the ARC and it is abundantly clear that a large portion of the Magnolia Point community is unaware of the requirements to seek ARC concurrence when making changes to the exterior of our homes and property.

This month let's discuss fences. In the community, fences are allowed on a property, with an approved ARC application for new or replacement. But the type and appearance of the fence is specific to a number of factors. This includes the location of the fence and in conjunction with your neighbors. Fences in Magnolia Point can be black aluminum, wood or vinyl.



Aluminum fences cannot exceed 4 or 4.5 feet high depending on the location of the fence, e.g. facing a pond or the golf course. Wood

(Shadowbox) can be 6 feet tall and has specific dimensions for slats and post as well as must be

stained a natural color. Vinyl can be 6 feet tall and may be white, beige or tan in color consistent with the color of nearby vinyl fencing. Since some of the irrigation water in Magnolia Point is literally the same as the drinking water in your home, bleaching occurs due to the chlorine added. This often leads to discoloration of the fence. In this case the fence is required to be re-stained and an ARC application approval is required to verify color choices. Your ARC can help with suggested cleaning processes and stains that are economical and acceptable. The ARC fence application can be accessed through this link: ARC Fence Application

For the month of December, the ARC received:

18 new applications.

17 were approved, average processing time was 3 days:

- 5 Fence new or staining
- 4 New Roof same or similar color
- 4 Other -tree removal
- 2 Paint same color
- 1 Landscaping
- 1 Driveway

1 was rejected (addition did not meet community standards)

This information is presented each month at the HOA Board meeting and published in the meeting minutes.

LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION

Your Landscape and Irrigation Committee has been busy in the winter months planting and planning. We started the winter season by assisting the Magnolia Point Holiday Decorations Committee with their winter decorating



vision. We planted 90 Poinsettia plants in front of the gatehouse house and at the front sign on Harbor Rd.

The Committee then turned their attention to the overgrown, dead and dying bushes on Borden Lane





median on Magnolia Point Boulevard. The overgrown woody bushes were given a heavy

trimming to cut the bushes back off of Magnolia Point Blvd and Borden Lane. The dead and dying bushes at the end near Constancia were removed and the area was graded and mulched. Irrigation issues were found. Once these are resolved, the committee plans to remove the bushes and planting new lower maintenance shrubs more suitable to the area.

In observance of Florida's Arbor Day, celebrated on the 3rd Friday of January, the committee held an Arbor Day Ceremony on Jan 20, 2023 that was well attended by community residents. We are hoping to make this observance an annual community event. **See page 11.**

Some future projects include the purchase and planting of crepe myrtle trees at the back gate, repairing the irrigation system near the front gatehouse and on one of the medians on Magnolia Boulevard, and working with Van Royal, owner of Exit Realty, to cleanup the bedding area and restore and replant the area on Magnolia Point Boulevard in front of Exit Realty that is owned by the community. Van has had the area along Glen Cottage trimmed up and cleaned out and will be trimming up the live oaks along the front of Exit Realty on Magnolia Boulevard.

The committee is hopeful more folks will come out and join us in our community beautification projects. There is a lot of gardening to be done!

WHAT IS A PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENT?

Golf gloves, hats, shoes, clubs, shorts, shirts...even bags: one size does not fit all. And no one body is the same as any other. In the case of our friend Kevin, the tips now and then from his playing partner as he's stepping off the tee box range from: 'You need to turn', 'You're not rotating', 'You're swaying', 'You're on your back foot'. Advice is everywhere, but guidance is sorely lacking.

Kevin is a 57 year old sales manager with a 12 handicap. He golfs several times a week, but is struggling with occasional shoulder pain and reduced power in his drive. What does 'Lower Quarter Rotation', one of the 13 movements evaluated during a golf swing assessment, have to do with his problem?

Kevin has worked with his local golf pro, taken lessons, and has done the usual searches online for golf tips to improve his swing, to no avail. In his case, it was found that he had a deficit in left hip internal rotation mobility and single leg balance, which was causing him to have a shortened backswing and reduced weight shift, leading to poor transfer of power during his downswing.

When a golfer can't rotate their hips fully, either internally or externally, the shoulders and spine take on the job. The golfer then leads with and overuses the wrists to drive and decelerate the club when they lack the strength or flexibility to effectively compensate at the shoulders or spine. The swing gets 'handsy'. Strokes add up. This will lead to shoulder and

low back pain down the line.

Another way golfers compensate for lack of hip mobility is by excessive fore-heel lift during the backswing. With insufficient hip rotation and excess torque on the spine, most golfers are forced to lift their heels and use their shoulders to wrap the club around their body. This is the main cause of clumsy or "fat" shots due to chopping action during the downswing.

A professional swing assessment includes a



comprehensive physical analysis of a golfer's 13 movements related to strength, mobility, balance, and coordination for whole-body function in relation to golf performance, and a swing analysis in several planes to identify swing faults.

A Physical Therapist can develop a custom corrective excersize program to remediate these problems.

You ask, 'Why do I need to have a swing analysis done by someone? Can't I just use an app on my phone?' While technology has come a long way in the past few years, nothing will replace the education, trained eye, and experience of a medical and sports professional.

THROWING SHADE

Warmer in the winter, cooler in the summer. Saving fabrics

and carpeting and furniture from the sun's assault. There's a favor you can do for your home, and your 'Interiors' will thank you for it.

At Magnolia Point, tinting home windows is a popular solution when curtains or shutters aren't enough. And those oddly-shaped windows or transoms are so challenging to cover, if at all. But forget that shiny office-building look. David Miller of the ARC says, "The

consensus is that reflective/mirror tinting would not be allowed as it could impact neighbors or traffic. Otherwise opacity would be at the homeowner's discretion."



Residential films allow either 50 or 25% of light in.



In other words, either '25' or '50', as shown above. An ARC application is needed, he adds.

While there are many different film products on the market, for different needs, they all have one thing in common: the windows have to be meticulously prepared. Some installers will clean them not once, but often twice. Razor blades are used to scrape the surface and dig out dirt at the edges and corners. A pressurized cleaning

solution is squeegeed on as a final step. Instantly, you'll be able to move back into areas of your home you're used to evacuating during certain times of the day, as temps return to bearable and glare is almost gone. So it's like an addition to your house. That goes a long way to

justifying the cost, which might surprise you as you consider estimates. But good films don't come cheap, and the work is highly specialized. And demanding.

We'd recently had a large tree in our yard extensively trimmed, and the sunlight was making our front rooms uninhabitable. And this was in January(!) The results after 'filming' were instant and dramatic. Nice to have those rooms back! And a 10% credit on our taxes is nice to look forward to.




January 12 – Best of Both
