REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Last month's board meeting was a very informative one, as many projects are moving forward as intended and progress is being made on projects throughout the community. The community's financial reports are now published online for 2023 showing overall positive position. One topic getting alot of discussion is the assessments, as of now the intention is to raise the assessments within the community for a variety of reasons, it's no secret that with inflation last year all of our expenses have gone up as well.

The back gate is moving forward with a few of the improvements that were approved at the previous meeting. The new Flock camera has been installed as well as consultation scheduled with the contractors to perform the rest of the work so we can slowly move towards opening the gate for access.

Tower park is still listed for sale with 1 interested buyer at the moment, a second survey was ordered to determine exactly what the property can be used for, hopefully we will have the results of that by the November board meeting to discuss more.

As a member of the board I do have an individual opinion, there are 5 of us on the board each of us were elected to be on the board to represent the homeowners. A Lot of items on the agenda have been on there for a while, a few longer than I have been on the board. They are controversial subjects, however decisions do have to be made on them, not every resident will always agree with our decisions. However, ultimately it is our responsibility to make them, even though some will have potential backlash, last week we lost one of our fellow board members over comments made by other residents, as well as a few chair members on our committees. These are all volunteer positions, and we are in need of more volunteers to fill them. The last thing any of us want is feeling like we are attacked if we do not agree with an individual's opinion. All of us are making any decision in the best interest of the overall community, not just a handful of them. I am personally going to be alot more out going over the next month in trying to find volunteers, there are alot of residents in this community that would be happy to help.

Many here are fine with the fact that the Club is privately owned. Others feel that the private ownership model here is fatally flawed. No matter your position, change is inevitable, and sooner or later, the current owners will move on. But then, maybe they won't. Maybe they have a plan for what's next that involves members of their own family, or others. We don't know. But the Use Agreement stipulates that the Magnolia Point Community Association be notified if the owners intend to sell, that we will be offered the opportunity to make an offer and have 90 days to reach terms agreeable to both parties. We'd like to introduce what we feel are the three options available when and if the Club is put in play.

This has been my public position since my one and only campaign for a Board seat in 2020. It was the pitch I gave at every doorstep where I was welcomed, was in my printed campaign fliers, posted to social media, and was the centerpiece of each of my Candidate Forum presentations. *Spoiler Alert:* No, I didn't get elected, so there's that.

It's not just my idea, from the 2022 Magnolia Point Strategic Plan: "Because the Club is the sole source of amenities for the community, seventy-eight percent of respondents feel the BoD should have an emergency plan in place in the event the Club ceases operation." One long-time resident and Mens' Golf Association member tells me the feeling among some in his group is, 'We're one hurricane away from disaster here.'

'Cease operation' or 'sell to another party', the effect is the same: business *not* as usual. There are three scenarios that could play out, three options that we have as a community:

Cross our fingers, and hope that the Club goes to somebody nice. A private individual, a corporation, it doesn't matter. Just as long as the new owner(s) respect the values of the

community, and come bearing resources and expertise to keep it a going concern, to benefit themselves, of course, but also the residents of Magnolia Point.

Make an Offer, and hope it's accepted. That's got a lot of upside, and downside. We will need to cover the purchase price and ongoing operating expenses. We're already \$438,00 per year in the 'contribution to overhead' column with the Use Agreement, so there's that. Still, ownership has a lot of unknowns, and we know nothing about Club finances, really, or any liens, off-balance sheet financing, or encumbrances. But we'll all be owners of the Club and, that's called *ownership*, not 'implied' home values, and that goes right to the bottom line of each home's equity here.

Prepare for another approach: This might more correctly be called option '2a': a combination of #1 & #2, above. We make an offer, and structure an equity sharing arrangement with the owner, either present or future, in which we contribute to ownership, and participate in operations, both contribution to overhead and a share in whatever profits are generated. Whether the latter involves monthly restaurant minimums, increased golf, tennis & event dues and/or public fees for same, residents volunteering time and skills for Club operations, well, it all needs to be worked out. (Full *Disclosure:* this option is inspired by a recommendation in the Strategic Plan, a document which, if you're not familiar with, we highly recommend for a thorough read.)

Which brings us, again, to the point of this appeal: we need to start planning something *now*. Just look at the 6 months of inertia that's bogged down progress on Tower Park's disposition. And those delays are plaguing an attempt to *sell* something we own.

We feel that as fiduciaries, the Board should take a leadership role in advancing discussion on this very pressing issue. Immediately.

LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION

We have been busy planning and prioritizing Landscape and Irrigation projects in preparation for the FY 2024 budget year as well as working on current projects. We have identified a few locations that would benefit from planting trees for shade and park benches to sit on to allow folks to spend time together more comfortably. Unfortunately, many of these community owned areas do not have irrigation or access to water and power for irrigation which makes it more difficult to implement. Once we finish upgrading and adding to current systems where we have irrigation along Magnolia Point Boulevard, we are planning on moving out into other areas and working to overcome these infrastructure issues that prevent us from moving forward at a faster pace.

Current projects and plans we are working on are:

Downed limbs and other debris were removed from the hedgerow on the exit side of Magnolia Point Boulevard and the planting area was cleaned out and trimmed. We discovered that the area further down Harbor Rd along our property where the right-of-way is overgrown is being used as a lawn debris dumping site. We will request approval for release of funds to remove the debris pile and clean up the area which we hope will discourage future dumping.

We have removed the agapanthus beds at the Magnolia Point Boulevard entrance. The tubers have been separated and cleaned up. The Committee feels we have more than we can use in other common areas and would like to offer the excess to community members as this is an ideal time to plant them. We will send out a notice on magpt.com concerning when and where they can be picked up.

The committee has received two bids to do the following tree removal and up-limbing projects at the front gate:

1) Removal of three oak trees in front of the Magnolia Point Boulevard entrance sign and raised flower bed. Clay County Electric has trimmed them back away from the power lines. The floodlights nearby will be bypassed and removed to avoid damage.

Removal of a water oak along the Exit side of Magnolia Point Boulevard due to disease; it is infected with a shelf or bracket parasitic fungus that destroys the tree from the inside out.

3) Removal of a water oak directly behind the gatehouse that is infected with mistletoe, a parasitic plant.

4) Up-limbing of the ten Magnolias along the hedgerows at the Magnolia Point Boulevard entrance to improve aesthetics as well as the airflow and sun exposure to the shrubs beneath them.

5) Clean-up and up-limbing of the trees on the median between the front sign of Magnolia Point

Boulevard and the gatehouse.

The Committee is planning on planting five trees in the community to replace those being removed. The Board approved the release of funds at its October 2023 meeting to proceed with these projects.

In addition, some of the trees and shrubs in the Magnolia Point Boulevard area and other areas are showing signs of health issues. Our plan is to have an ISA certified arborist assess the condition of these trees and shrubs. We are planning to request approval for release of funds at the November 2023 meeting for the evaluation.

The Committee has received bids on additional projects including:

- 1) power-washing and staining the fence along the cart path on the entrance side of Magnolia Point Boulevard.
- 2) power-washing the fence along the road outside the Medinah gate entrance.

Other community projects we are planning on completing in November are:

- 1) removal of the Magnolia leaves and mulching the Magnolia Point Boulevard entrance sign at Harbor Road.
- 2) Sodding along the cart path near the flower beds in the lawn area along Harbor Rd.

3) Clean-up and mulching the two beds

4) electrical work on the LED floodlights in the areas along the Magnolia Point area sign and in the median between the back of the sign and the gatehouse.

Irrigation: A proposal from Duval Landscape to add 3 new irrigation zones to existing clocks and controllers on the entrance side of Magnolia Point Boulevard near the gatehouse was approved at the October 2023 Board meeting. There is currently no irrigation in that area. When installation is completed, sod and shrubs can be added to the currently bare areas. We will be requesting a release of funds for sodding the area at the November 2023 Board meeting.

November Planting tips: Many shrubs such as camellias, pittosporum, lorepetalum can be planted in the fall in our hardiness zone (9a. As the soil temperature cools, be on the look-out for fungal diseases such as brown patch and large patch, in turf grasses such as St Augustine. Suggestions for flowering bulbs are crinums, caladiums, callas, daylilies, agapanthus and amaryllis. Now is also a good time to plant cool weather vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, kale and lettuce and cool weather herbs including cilantro, dill, fennel, parsley, sage, and thyme.

We invite our fellow community members to help with finding homes with gardens that the community feels deserve recognition in it's Yard-of-the Quarter Award. The next award will be for the fourth quarter of 2023-October through December. Please contact Cindy Francisco at pltluvr44@aol.com with your yard suggestions.

We would also like to invite our fellow Magnolia Point community members to join the committee and help us move forward on our various renovation and beautification projects. ACCESS CONTROL

(Update to September & October reports.)
Please be advised that we are aware of an issue with not receiving notifications of visitors from the Guard House. TEKWave has been working on the issue regarding text alerts not being received by some residents. They have been and will continue working with their text messaging service provider until the issue is resolved.

Currently, there is a known issue between TEKWave's text messaging provider and apparently two national providers (T-Mobile and AT&T). Essentially TEKWave's text is being blocked by the carriers, and as far as TEKWave is aware, only these two carriers. Unfortunately, this means that we are awaiting a resolution from our messaging provider and the mobile carriers. TekWave has assured us that they are

doing everything they can to get a prompt resolution

from their text messaging provider. We will update everyone as soon as we know something more but please be aware that we are working on getting this resolved.

In October we added a new Flock camera system (similar to the one at the front gate) to the back entrance. This is the first addition to the Medinah gate

upgrade. As a reminder this system is a camera that can read a license plate and would notify Green Cove Springs police of suspicious vehicles. This will also simplify the process of identifying those who hit the gate arms and increase our ability to get reimbursed for the damages.

You may be noticing some work going on near the front gate over the next couple of weeks. AT&T is upgrading their system from copper to fiber lines and in order to get the new line to the gatehouse they will need to run the fiber from Constancia. In order to do this, the new line will have to be buried under both Exit Realty driveways and then under Magnolia Point Blvd. AT&T has a contractor who will do the boring under the driveways and road. Once that is done the fiber can be run. The good news is that since this is a AT&T project to upgrade their system so it is at no cost to us.

As I mentioned last month there has been an issue regarding the visitor/guest lists in the TEKWave VMS software. While entering a new resident's information into the system, the CAM (May Management) made a mistake which unfortunately corrupted the entire database. This error caused many resident's lists to be moved, either to inactive or to a wrong category. So please check your guest/visitor lists and see if they need to be adjusted. The CAM has offered to assist you with fixing your lists if you would like them to, or you can fix it yourselves if that is easier. They apologize for the error and confusion and we are taking steps to see that this doesn't occur again.

At their September meeting the Board approved funds for opening the back (Medinah) gate to non-resident traffic as well as replacing the cameras at the gate. As traffic to and from our community increases through that gate, opening it to visitor, contractor, and Club traffic is seen as a requirement by many in the neighborhood. We are proceeding with acquiring the necessary materials but implementing this proposal probably won't be completed until early 2024. As an update to last month's report, in order to open the gate to nonresidents in a secure manner, we will need to do the following:

1. Install a kiosk in the median (visitor lane) that can: scan drivers' licenses, scan VMS QR codes, interact with Tekwave VMS, call resident's registered telephone number (resident can open gate via phone), or contact a remote guard.

Note: when a visitor or contractor is granted

admittance by a resident via their phone, this bypasses all security screenings (e.g., no driver's license required and no TEKWave record or security screening will take place). Therefore, to be consistent with how we operate at the front gate, it is Access



Control's recommendation that we do not use the resident admittance option and all non-residents must contact a remote guard (either at the gatehouse or off-premises).

If the remote guard option is chosen the kiosk can connect visitors to a guard either at the front gatehouse or off premise. Since the daytime guard is usually very busy it is unlikely they will be able to also handle traffic at the back gate. However, they probably will be able to monitor both gates between 11pm and 7am without additional guards and costs due to the low volume of traffic during that time.



2. Replace the outdated cameras and network video recorder (NVR). These new cameras will be used to identify visitors, their vehicles and license plates as

required. Also included is pulling down our current enclosure where the NVR is located, replacing it with an air-conditioned unit, and rewiring everything incide.

- **3. Replace/Update Medinah gate signage** to provide instructions for visitor traffic as well as remove visitor lane bollards.
- **4. Update damaged electronic controller** box at gate.

COVENANTS REVIEW & CONSOLIDATION COMMITTEE

The Declaration of Covenants is the primary governing document in our Association. Up until the time the last lot in Magnolia Point was sold by the Developer, the Developer basically had exclusive voting rights in the Association and could amend existing Declaration of Covenants document or create new Declaration of Covenants as he/she saw fit. That brought about the current situation where there are 16 separate Declaration of Covenants documents, but there is one Declaration of Covenants document text covering the earlier building phases up to Phase III (Clubhouse Villas, Golf Side Villas, Estate Lots, and Phases I, II, and III) and one Declaration of Covenants document text covering later building phases IV through VIIIC. Each document describes the contract between the Developer and the lot owners, all of which are Association members. These two documents do not have the same structure and wording and need to be reconciled. The resulting new

document will reflect current State and local laws and consider the existing Association Policies used in Rules Enforcement since the Developer turned over voting rights to the Association members in 2019.

Any new Declaration of Covenants document will require the approval of the Association membership. In order to assist each lot owner in making an informed decision about changing the Association's Declaration of Covenants, this Committee has a goal of creating a strong communication channel with all Association members. If you currently do not have an account established on the Association's website, we encourage you to do so as this is the most efficient way to exchange information, comments and concerns between Association members, Committees and the Board of Directors.

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PLAYING THROUGH



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PELVIC THERAPIES

Pelvic health concerns encompass a spectrum of conditions, including but not limited to urinary issues like incontinence and overactive bladder. Incontinence refers to the involuntary loss of urine, which can occur during activities such as coughing, sneezing, or exercising, while overactive bladder involves a sudden and frequent urge to urinate, often resulting in an increased frequency of bathroom visits. It's more common than you might think, and it deserves discussion and understanding.

These conditions can significantly impact an individual's quality of life, leading to social and psychological distress. Factors such as pregnancy, childbirth (both cesarean and vaginal deliveries), aging, obesity, and certain medical conditions can contribute to the development of pelvic health issues. No matter the origin of symptoms it is never too late to begin your rehabilitation journey. Keep in mind that your age or starting later in life does not dictate your outcomes.

Licensed physical therapists specializing in pelvic health play a crucial role in the management and treatment of these conditions. They employ evidence-based approaches to evaluate and address muscular and connective tissue impairments within the pelvic region determining the underlying factor if the pelvic floor is underactive (hypo or weak) or overactive (hyper or tight). By offering tailored rehabilitation programs, licensed physical therapists aim to empower individuals, improve their functional abilities, and enhance their overall well-being, thereby enabling them to regain control and confidence in managing pelvic health issues. Incontinence, urinary urgency and constipation are NOT normal symptoms as we age or for those having children. These are symptoms of a present pelvic floor dysfunction which can be treated! Now is the time to gain back control of your life and your pelvic floor health.




Joanie Braatz – Many Thanks!

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS THE WORLD

On October 18th, 33 women from the MPWC traveled to downtown Jacksonville for a cruise on the St. Johns River. The weather couldn't have been more perfect. We boarded the River Taxi and were immediately treated to jumping bottlenose dolphins. There was a huge pod and they were frolicking and playing with each other. The shrimp were running and the mullet were there, but we all decided that we must have happened on mating season. Our tour guide said he had never seen anything like it. I've been to Marineland and Sea World to see their dolphins; eeing them in the natural setting was far more exciting.

After watching the dolphins the taxi proceeded down the river and our guide told us many things about the history of Jacksonville past, present and future. 



Part Two - Electric Wheels


We were never electric vehicle fanatics and only thought of the idea as a tow vehicle after being in an F250 and feeling like it was a "monster truck." Friends probably get tired of us talking about our new wheels,



but as many Rivian YouTubers have stated "the Rivian is the absolutely best purchase they have ever made." A little-known fact is RJ Scaringe, Rivian's Founder, CEO and Chief

Engineer, grew up in Rockledge, Florida and named the company after the Indian River. His dream was to build his own vehicle that would be environmentally friendly. All the trucks and SUV's are built in Normal, Illinois and purchased directly from the manufacturer. By next spring, there will be a Rivian Service Center here in Jacksonville.

The big question everyone asks is "how far can you tow on a charge?" In short, not very far, probably around 150 miles or so. But we are aware of that and will not be in a hurry to get anywhere. Once we reach our destination, we plan to stay parked for a couple of weeks and use our R1T for sightseeing around the area. When we do have to stop, we will have our home with us where we can fix a meal, take a nap or use the restroom. Jenn can also get some work done as she works remotely.



One of the nice features of the Rivian is the panoramic glass roof. Although for safety reasons, the driver cannot look out of it, the backseat passengers have a fantastic view. 


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THE BLACKWELL

Two or three friends having suggested that if I would write something about good food, they would try to find time to read it. I yield at last to this frenzied public demand and herewith tender my first issue.

Firstly, let me discuss the ethical issues. I am not being paid for this. I am plagiarizing the title from one of my old friends, John Cardillo, Esq., a serious foodie who wrote a column for years in the Colliier County Bar Association in Naples, FL where I grew up as a lawyer and Circuit Judge. He coined the name, The Traveling Fork and I give John my serious gratitude for the use of that name.

Further, I will neither solicit nor accept payment, free or discounted meals, or any other gratuities for providing names of food establishments in this column.

Now, having cleaned up the ethical issues, let me discuss good food. If you are looking for continental cuisine and fine wines, you will have to go to

Paris. Here, we will deal with honest to goodness good food.

I am loathe to mention any food chains, although this first issue will feature one—Bonefish Grill just off I-295

(long bridge) on San Jose in JAX. Marcia and I ate there recently and found great food and warm, friendly service. Marcia ordered a fancy treatment of Cod with a cheese sauce; I had skewered scallops and shrimp, seasoned and grilled alongside Chimmichurri sauce. While we awaited the food (with fresh vegetables) we were treated to freshly baked warm bread with olive oil and pesto on the side.

The Assistant Manager came by to see if we were satisfied, near the end of our meal; we were. This restaurant rates 5 stars in our book.

A word of warning: we like various ethnic foods, some highly spiced! We will tell you honestly if we recommend something that comes in hot! Bon Appetit!



Bill 'Gaucho' Blackwell's Black Bean Chili

2 ½ lbs Beef coarsely ground or venison

- 1/2 lb smoked bacon
- 2 cans black beans
- 1 large can of diced tomatoes
- 3 tbsp minced garlic
- 3 medium onions, chopped
- 6 green jalapeno peppers, chopped

Mix the following seasonings in a large measuring cup: 1 tbsp mustard powder, 4 tbsp chili powder, 1 tbsp curry powder, 1 tbsp seasoning salt, 3 bay leaves, 2 tbsp cumin seed or powder, 1 tbsp oregano, ½ tbsp cayenne pepper.

Fry the bacon in a large pot or Dutch Oven until crisp, then remove and



place the crisp bacon on paper towels until later, when you will crumble the crisp bacon and add it to the chili pot. Saute the onions and garlic until translucent then add the ground meat and saute until all is brown. Now add the other ingredients minus the black beans which will not be added until later.

Add one or two cups of chicken broth and simmer for 2 hours. Then add the black beans and slow boil for 30 more minutes. Thicken with cornmeal sprinkled over the surface oil of the chili and adjust seasonings as necessary.

Garnish with grated cheese or fresh chopped onions or just ladle it on a large bed of rice and enjoy.





MAGNOLIA'S 'MOSS ANIMALS'

Wildlife abounds at Magnolia Point: deer, gators, fox & coyote, herons on errands, golfers & joggers, bass, bunnies, 'dillers & mailbox killers, possum & geese...a lot of these!

And another animal you don't see everyday: *Bryozoans*. Commonly known as 'moss animals', are not plants, though you might think so, seeing them for the first time. They're aquatic invertebrates that live in colonies, typically attached to submerged surfaces such as rocks, plants, or man-made structures. They can be found in both marine and freshwater environments, although the freshwater species are the focus here.

Pectinatella magnifica is a species of bryozoan found most recently in a pond at Magnolia Point, is known for its large gelatinous colonies. These colonies can vary in size and can be as large as a basketball, making them quite conspicuous in freshwater ecosystems. They are found in slow-moving or stagnant freshwater bodies such as lakes, ponds, and slow-moving rivers. 'Moss animals' can thrive in a

variety of water conditions but are often associated with nutrient-rich environments.

Spoiler Alert! The life cycle of Pectinatella magnifica involves both sexual and asexual reproduction. Asexual reproduction occurs through budding, where new zooids (individual members of the colony) develop from the parent zooid. Sexual reproduction involves the release of sperm and eggs into the water, with fertilization occurring externally. The fertilized eggs develop into larvae, which eventually settle and develop into new colonies.

Pectinatella magnifica contributes to the health of freshwater lakes and ponds in several ways:

Water Filtration: Bryozoans are filter feeders: they filter small particles, including bacteria, algae, and organic matter, from the water. By doing so, they help to maintain water clarity and reduce the abundance of certain microorganisms.

Habitat and Food Source: The colonies provide habitat and a food source for various aquatic organisms, including microinvertebrates and small fish, thereby contributing to the overall biodiversity of the ecosystem.

Nutrient Cycling: They play a role in nutrient cycling by removing excess nutrients from the water, thus helping to prevent eutrophication, a process where excessive nutrients lead to algal blooms and oxygen depletion, harming other aquatic life.

Stabilization of Sediments: The presence of bryozoans can help stabilize sediments, preventing erosion and maintaining the overall ecological balance of the aquatic environment.

While *Pectinatella magnifica* and other bryozoans can contribute positively to the health of the lakes and ponds here, certain conditions can lead to their overgrowth, causing issues such as clogging of waterways and pond inlet structures or overflows. As with any species, a balance is necessary to ensure that their presence does not disrupt the natural equilibrium of the ecosystem.
