LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION



The crape myrtle trimming, clean-up and shaping for approximately 64 trees was completed. Several trees are undergoing rejuvenation due to long term neglect and/or severe pruning sometimes referred to as "Crepe Murder".

Our tree replacement project had a minor setback. The Borden Lane median has too many major underground utilities running through it to accommodate additional large trees we had hoped to plant on either end. We will be conducting site visits throughout the community to find locations better suited to the trees. We will also be conducting site visits to areas that have been identified by committee members as needing renovation work.

We reviewed estimates we received for work at the top of the Committee's priority list. We will be removing and transplanting the rest of the Jack Frost *ligustrum* in front of the Magnolia Point sign on Harbor Rd. and will be grading and sodding most of the area, leaving space for bedding plants around the sign. In addition, 5 Podocarpus shrubs and additional ligustrum shrubs will be planted on the Exit side hedgerow. The hedgerow and the beds around the crape myrtles on the Exit side will be mulched.

A meeting was held with Laura Burgess, Jon Bastress and Van Royal of EXIT Realty to discuss vinyl wrapping the utility boxes with custom nature and wildlife scenes. At the time of the meeting we had made contact with the local company that designed and installed this type of vinyl wrap in Orange Park, and will determine if our community would like to continue the project.

As the weather warms, we will be purchasing bedding plants to replace the cold tolerant, heat sensitive flowers as they begin to die back and replacing dead and declining shrubs. When replanting flower beds, it is important to add compost and slow or controlled release fertilizer before installing the new bedding plants.

We had an irrigation issue near the front entrance that required temporarily shutting down the irrigation system. Duval Irrigation located and fixed a broken pipe. Another issue with the Borden Lane clock developed and Duval has been scheduled for diagnosis and repair of that clock.

Other community projects we are planning and working on are:

- 1) Cleanup of the area on the exit side of Magnolia Point Blvd at Harbor Rd.
- 2) Identification of areas in the community frequented by residents where trees and/or park benches can be installed.
- 3) Planting flowers at the bases of the columns on the entrance and exit sides of the Magnolia Point Blvd, entrance when the right bedding plants for the conditions at that location becomes available in sufficient numbers.
- 4) The committee received approval for the release of funds to power wash and stain the wood privacy fence along the side of the cart path on the entrance side of Magnolia Point Blvd. We have contacted the vendor selected

for the project and are working on verifying the required licensing and insurance documentation.

5) Heavy trimming or possible removal and replanting of the overgrown and declining shrubs on the Borden Lane median. The median is located between Magnolia Point Blvd and Borden Lane that originally had shrubs planted around them to hide the utility boxes and other utility equipment located on that median.

6) Tree removal and redesign of the median at the intersection of Constancia and Magnolia Point Blvd.

FYI: The hardiness zone for our area was revised to 9b from 9a in 2023 meaning that plants that require a slightly warmer average temperature are now recommended for planting in our area. If you would like to know for sure what plant hardiness zone you are in, just go to the USDA hardiness zone website; you can now type in your zip code and it will tell you.

April Planting Tips: This is a busy month for gardening in North Florida. Now is the ideal time to plant Caladium, Canna and other bulbs, heat loving herbs, such as rosemary, oregano, basil and sage and warm season vegetables. Be on the look-out for aphids as they love tender new growth. It's division time for bulb clumps such as agapanthus, ornamental grasses and herbaceous perennials. April is also the time to apply fertilizer when you see new growth.

ACCESS CONTROL

As some of you are aware we had a big backup at the front gate on Thursday, March 21st, that extended well past the corner on Harbor Road. After investigating the problem, I discovered that there were a few factors that caused the delay. There was an estate sale that added to the normal traffic, and there were contractors showing up without their driver's license who needed to be turned around. But the biggest reason for the backup was contractors/visitors showing up and not being in the Visitor Management System (VMS). If a non-resident shows up and they are in the VMS they are processed in a matter of seconds. If a non-resident shows up and is not in VMS, per the Post Orders, the guard is required to call the resident to get their permission to let them in and this takes from a few to several minutes. The guard was following the proper procedure as generated by us (the HOA) and agreed to by the Securitas District Manager. To avoid these backups in the future we need residents to put their visitors and contractors into the VMS. Download the 'Visitor Management Desktop Guide for Residents' for guidance on how to enter your visitors into the system.



The HOA Board approved at their February meeting the funding to put a new street light in the vicinity of 3455 Olympic Drive. It will have a Visionaire light fixture which will provide maximum illumination. This area it has a curve that has no lighting which makes it very dangerous. Also, there is a wooded lot across from this address that has been used to gain access to our neighborhood to conduct criminal activity. This new street light will help with both of these issues. It is taking our electrical contractor, T&M Electric, longer than anticipated to acquire the materials needed but they hope to have the new light installed this month.

At their September meeting the Board approved funds for upgrades at the back (Medinah) gate. This work included adding a kiosk (for eventually opening the gate to non-residents), replacing the cameras, and upgrading the associated electronics. The new cameras feature a 3 in 1 camera unit that contains a camera that looks at the gates, a camera that looks at the island where the new kiosk is located, and a camera that looks down Madinah Lane towards SR 315. It also originally included two new IR license plate reader (LPR) cameras that we have discovered were incompatible with our servers. These LPRs are going to be replaced at no cost to us with conventional cameras. The Kiosk has several options that can be individually configured for our neighborhood as we see fit. A survey has been developed to get residents input for which mode(s) to utilize for granting access to visitors.

COVENANTS REVIEW AND CONSOLIDATION

If you were at the Annual Membership Meeting, you heard our report on where we are in our project, how large the task is and how it can't be accomplished without participation of our Board, our Committees and at least 75% approval from a vote of the membership of the Association. Quoting from that report: "So we, as MPCA members, have a challenge, which is also an opportunity. An opportunity to update and upgrade our Governing Documents, to broaden our communication channels, and to establish a clear path for making decisions as a whole organization."

The current Declarations of Covenants state, "this Declaration may be amended at any time upon the request of the Developer (now the Association), if such requested amendment is approved by the affirmative vote of 75% of votes cast by Owners at a duly called meeting of the Association". Our Committee has to gain an understanding of exactly what those words mean in our given situation where there are 16 Declaration documents, so that the Association can proceed with the required voting process.

Several observations of our recent Association vote at the March 12th Membership Meeting:

- 1. Of the 967 lot owners/members, 44% cast a vote
- 2. Removing the invalid ballots, 38% of the members cast a valid vote.
- 3. Level of participation is a big factor in the results.

We, as an Association, need much higher participation in the membership voting process. Certainly a goal worth striving for. If you did not attend the Membership Meeting, please stay informed by reading the newsgrams about the meeting and the meeting minutes. Our Committee activity is documented on the webpage on the Association website. Take a peek.




Proposed Executive Officer Slate

The date of manufacture is inside the unit on most alarms but if you cannot find a date, it is recommended the unit be replaced. This information was provided by Robert Sullivan, a Clay County resident, son-in-law of member Marlene Abbate, and who serves as a District Chief with the Alachua County Fire Rescue in Gainesville. Mr. Sullivan was the guest speaker at the member meeting on March 13 and spoke on numerous topics from his experience as a Certified Fire Fighter/EMT and Critical Care Paramedic, responding to major incidents as an Incident Commander. Several other important take-aways from his presentation were to always stay on the line with a 911 operator until the EMTs arrive, have a fire escape plan for your family and conduct fire drills with grandchildren and guests, CPR is now done through chest compressions to the beat of "Staying Alive", and EMTs decide on which hospital a patient will be transported to depending on their symptoms.

Residents who participate should display a balloon on their mailbox, and the merchandise should be set up in their driveways as close to the garages as possible.


Since the sale is open to the public, please monitor the parking in your area.

The Magnolia Point Landscape and Irrigation Committee announces the Charlene and Kevin Jenkins residence located at 1742 Colonial Drive as our selection for the 2nd Quarter 2024-Yard of the Quarter. They are the first owners of their beautiful home which was completed in July of 2020.

The building package included the pool/screened enclosure, outdoor kitchen and landscape design and installation. Charlene and Kevin worked with the landscaper to design the garden area, placement of trees and choosing the plants. Soon after they moved in, they found that the deer loved some of their landscape choices as much as they did. This required a change in some of the landscape choices.

The Jenkins love to work in their yard and gardens. They use color, shape and texture of the leaves to provide contrast. In two of the front beds, they planted sunshine *Ligustrum*, chocolate *Loropetalum* and *Podocarpus* (Japanese Yew). there is a large bed with azaleas and 2 areas near the front door with ferns and bromeliads. There are two large ligustrum on either end of the front gardens, framing the house. Charlene is interested in topiary and has four beautiful specimens flanking their front door that she meticulously maintains herself.

They planted two crape myrtles in the front lawn for added color and have two large staghorn ferns suspended from the live oaks on either side of the front lawn. There are two new additions to the back yard, as the Jenkins purchased and had two large Sylvester date palms recently installed.

What are some of the main improvements you've done to the yard?


We started from the ground up, and the building package included landscaping the yard.

We enjoy working on the yard and then sitting on the front and back porches relaxing and enjoying the fruits of our labor.




We just added two large Sylvester Palms to the back yard. We purchased the day before we did this interview!




Do you work with a landscaper on design ideas?




HAND POSITION ON THE GOLF CLUB FOR LOW VS. HIGH WEDGE SHOTS

Golf is a game of precision and control, where the slightest adjustment can have a significant impact on the outcome of a shot. Hand position on the golf club is always critical, particularly when executing wedge shots.

The position of the hands can determine the trajectory, spin, and distance of the ball, making it a fundamental skill for golfers to master.

For low wedge shots, "chip shots" or "bump and runs," the hand position is crucial in keeping the ball flight lower and promoting a more controlled roll upon landing. To achieve this, you should position the hands slightly ahead of the ball at address. This forward hand placement encourages a steeper angle of attack, resulting in a descending blow that imparts less loft on the ball. Additionally, the hands should lead the clubhead through impact, ensuring that the loft of the clubface is reduced, and the ball is struck with a more delofted face. This technique helps to minimize the ball's backspin and launch angle, allowing for a lower trajectory that is less affected by wind and provides





In contrast, high "lobs" or "flop shots," require a different hand position to achieve the desired high trajectory and soft landing. For these shots, golfers should position their hands level with or slightly behind the ball at address. This setup allows the clubhead to slide under the ball more easily, utilizing the full loft of the wedge to launch the ball higher into the air. The hands should remain passive during the swing, allowing the clubhead to release naturally and add loft to the shot. The goal is to create maximum backspin, which helps the ball stop quickly on the green, even from short distances. This technique is particularly useful when facing obstacles such as bunkers or when the pin is closely tucked behind a hazard.

Understanding the relationship between hand position and ball trajectory is essential for golfers looking to improve their short game. Again, for low wedge shots, a forward hand position promotes a lower ball flight and greater control, making it ideal for situations where the golfer needs the ball to run out on the green. On the other hand, a neutral or slightly rearward hand position is key for high wedge shots, where stopping the ball quickly with minimal roll is the priority.

In conclusion, the hand position on the golf club plays a pivotal role in executing both low and high wedge shots effectively. Golfers must practice and develop a feel for the correct hand placement for each type of shot, as it can greatly influence their ability to navigate various course conditions and scoring situations. By mastering the art of hand positioning, golfers can add versatility to their short game, ultimately leading to lower scores and a more enjoyable experience on the course.




All Things Golf Cart: Buying, Owning, Modding, Driving, Accessorizing & Maintaining Them

A rechargeable lithium-ion power pack supplies over 20 hours of listening enjoyment which means it won't affect your cart's battery life. This 28" sound bar has a two-year warranty and is waterproof so if you get caught in the rain there are no worries. And did I mention 20 hours of on a charge, and no wires to your batteries or connection issues? A light show while enjoying your favorite music. You'll impress the crowd or the family when you pull up with this addition on your cart.

Today, we will feature an eating experience at the Green Papaya

Restaurant at 8635 Blanding Boulevard just off I-295. This restaurant features Thai and Sushi cuisine, and it has a very pretty pictorial menu showing each particular menu item. The menu is extensive in content and our orders matched the pictures in the menu.



Marcia and I both like most ethnic foods and our appetites were well served here. The only problem (and it's a nice problem to have) is there are so many food entries on the menu and they are so attractively displayed by the pictures that choosing the orders is made difficult.

We started with a shared Green Papaya Sampler featuring 2 egg rolls, 2 fresh spring rolls, 2 skewered chicken strips, 2 crab Rangoons, 2 coconut shrimps with Thai garlic sauce and a peanut sauce, and an order of seaweed salad. Marcia ordered a Philadelphia Sushi Roll with smoked salmon, avocado and cream cheese. I got a Drunken Noodle dish made of rice noodles stir fried with fresh Thai basil, green peppers, onions, scallions, bean sprouts, and scallops seasoned to a #4 level ("heat index").



For dessert we ordered an ice cream item called "Mochi Ice Cream" in an adventurous spirit. It was served on a plate with a vanilla cream in the center, surrounded by strawberry, green tea, and mango mochi

balls, with flavored ice cream in the center encapsulated in mochi rice coatings. As ice cream lovers, we were not fans of this dessert item. We would rather have the ice cream with no mochi rice coverings. Other than our dessert, we were well pleased with this eating adventure. We plan to go back to try some of the many other interesting menu items.



Are you ready for a new pair of walking shoes yet? If you're on my exercise plan, you're probably on your third pair by now. If so, lace them up and head over to Gainvesville to the **Sweetwater Wetlands Park**. It's a great place to exercise safely and view wildlife at the same time. Plan to make it a day as the Park is 59 miles away or approximately 1 hour and 15 minutes.

While you're in the neighborhood, stop by Paynes Prairie Preserve State Park. It's more of an escape into the wilderness so be



ready to hike. If you're lucky, you'll see bison and wild horses there.

Sweetwater is located at 325 SW Williston Road in Alachua County. They're open from 7am to sunset daily. Entrance fees are \$5 per car and \$2 per person for bicyclists, pedestrians and buses. Bring correct change to leave in the honor box. Mobility tours are available on request by calling 352-554-5871. You must schedule these tours at least two weeks in advance. If you have other special needs accommodations,



call the number above 48 hours in advance. Included is almost one mile of ADA accessible trail on pervious concrete and boardwalk surfaces and viewing platforms. The walking areas are clean and well maintained. Restrooms are available.

The park consists of 125 acres of man-made ponds and wetlands. The purpose of Sweetwater was to improve water quality of wetlands in both Paynes Prairie and the Florida Aquifer. Water is filtered as it flows into Paynes Prairie from Sweetwater Branch. The origin of this creek is located northeast of downtown Gainesville. Stormwater runoff has been diverted into the creek for over a century, buried in culverts throughout the city. In the 1930's ranchers cut canals through the prairie killing off the wetlands. Plans were made to build a natural water filtration system and the hiking trails were a bonus. The result was a beautiful spot to enjoy the beauty of Florida.

Because of the potential conflict with alligators and other wildlife, pets are never allowed in the park. Biking, horseback riding, camping or driving cars are not allowed. Fishing is also not permitted but you can photograph as long as you don't use a drone.

The park has 3.5 miles on crushed gravel trails and boardwalks surrounded by beautiful native plants, animals, birds, turtles, bobcats, otters, butterflies and more. In fact, it's home to more than 260 species of birds and animals. I was lucky enough to see the Cracker horses, in the distance, on my last trip.

Gainesville is home to many nature parks including the Morningside Nature Center, Loblolly Woods Nature Park, Bivens Arm Nature Park and Clear Lake Nature Park. Don't forget to stop by the Butterfly Rainforest at the Florida Museum of Natural History. Get off that couch and take the family to Gainesville for an afternoon stroll through the park!
