Next, we were off to a bucket list campground, Gamble Rogers State Park in Flagler Beach. You know that saying when a door closes, a window opens? We just lived it. About six weeks ago, Clay County Fairgrounds moved our return date back a week. Though we had several weeks to plan, that's not much for a Florida spot anywhere near the water. Plus, there aren't many places to camp near Green Cove to begin with. So, we hopped on the computer and swear someone must have just cancelled as we were looking. After our scramble at the end of last month, the Titusville Elks was a safe place to land. They had room and gave us a chance to secure other reservations. And then April became the month of state, county, and city parks.

Our first stop was a Brevard County Park called Manatee Hammock that is right on the Indian River in Titusville, just across from the Vehicle Assembly Building at the Kennedy Space Center. Not a bad spot for viewing the rocket launches. The campground is small but has a pool and covered pickle ball court. The shaded and level campsites are spacious, with several pullthrough spots. It was a great location for visiting Central Florida and Orlando.

Next, we moved north to Hanna Park, run by the city of Jacksonville, that has a couple of miles of beachfront plus a lake for boating and fishing. There is also a water park for the kids that is open from May through September. Hanna Park is well known for its mountain biking trails, the most in the state. The campground is extremely popular because half the sites are on the Atlantic Ocean and the other half on the intracoastal waterway. The park is gorgeous with dark skies at night and cool ocean breezes. And it takes all of five minutes to get from rig to the ocean boardwalk to see the pounding waves or the launches from the Cape.
