I can't help but notice all the decorations and mentions of Thanksgiving and Christmas that surround us when we turn on our large screen Ultra HD TVs, enter a grocery store or do any web browsing. One needs a time machine to visit the past to understand some of the references used. Black Friday? Pilgrims? Football Friday? cheek on Friday morning by 7 AM. The stories that each manager shared were both funny and frightening, as anything involving the public can be. For me it meant reviewing our operational and evacuation plans during emergencies. Inspecting the property for tripping hazards,

lighting issues, etc, etc. We geared up by adding more uniformed and plain clothes police to our security force. Yes, there was a time when shoplifters were arrested and sent to a holding cell. (That's what happened when you stole something in the good old days!) For me it meant getting off Thanksgiving day at 4 PM to enjoy thanksgiving at home with my family and then being at the mall from 7 AM until ?? Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Today, Black Friday occurs earlier and earlier to draw more customers to spend more money. Enough reminiscing.

I still enjoy the time to pause and think about all that I have to be thankful for. My family, my run in with cancer when I was 39 and the father of a 2 year old. Looking back, I cannot believe how lucky I am. I hope my luck holds over for the next 4 months and I can make a positive impact on our HOA, the residents and my neighbors. My sincere hope is that you too will take time to reflect on all that you have to be thankful for and continue to enjoy the friends and neighbors that you have met here at Magnolia Point!

More important, Christmas to me represents Joy and Hope. Two things that we all see too little of today. Again, when I was a kid my folks would bundle us up (it was cold in KC!) and we would drive down to the Countryside Plaza to watch the Christmas Lights turned on. After they came on, we would walk around the Plaza looking into all the store front windows with Lionel trains running under plastic rock tunnels, little spurts of steam coming out of their stacks (you could buy little pills that you dropped into the smoke stack of model trains in those days and they looked just like the were steaming down the track!) train sets compared to the newer HO sets that became popular after the mid 6os. It was a magical time. For many of us as we matured and began to understand that there was a deeper meaing to the Christmas season. Sure, it included joy and celebration and visiting "Santa" at Emory, Bird,

Thayer on the Plaza but it also gave us a perfect way to end the old year and welcome in the New Year; Steeped in Joy, Wonderment and Hope, knowing that our faith in a greater power can and will carry us through the rest of our lives.

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ACCESS CONTROL

There was one significant equipment failure this past month. The main entrance, residence-side barrier arm would not open via the remotes. This resulted in several days of it being inoperable. Parts have been ordered for the repair, but have been delayed. In the interim, a temporary workaround was put in place. Resolution is expected within the next week or so.



TEKControl App

The **TEKControl App** for the Visitor Management System (VMS) was recently updated. Many of you may have discovered it while attempting to add a visitor. We did not receive any prior notice that the upgrade was taking place. We have requested that TEKWave provide notice in the event of another change like this one so that we can give everyone a heads-up. If you experience issues with the updated app, please contact May Management for resolution.

Many of you have noticed long lines of vehicles at the front gate (visitor side) waiting to be processed in, especially at peak hours during the week. You may have also heard complaints from some of your guests regarding the wait time they had at the front gate. This has been a problem for some time and does not seem to be getting better. The primary reason for such delays is that residents are not pre-registering their visitors ahead of time. This results in the guard attempting to contact the resident for permission to allow them in. Additionally, many visitors come to the gate not knowing the address they are going to visit. This can also cause delays, especially if it is a common name with others in the neighborhood.

Whether it be contractor or guest, please register them using the VMS app. It really improves the processing time at the gate. You have the option of sending your guests a pass (QR code) which is quickly scanned by the guard at the front gate or can also be used at the rear gate visitor kiosk. If you need assistance using the app, contact May Management or Access Control at access.control@magpt.com, and someone will assist you. Calling the guard to have them input your visitor information for you is not the right way, it only results in more delays at it will likely take you several tries to get through. So please, use the VMS, we are all paying for it.

LANDSCAPE & IRRIGATION

In addition to their regular contributions, many members of the committee also volunteered for the Holiday Decorations Committee and have been working on decoration projects such as the Medinah gate, the Magnolia Point Boulevard gate, the reindeer, the elf hats and bollards, and the tree lighting display at the main entrance. Our November activities included:

Landscaping:

- Removed the coleus in the gatehouse bed that were killed off by the recent October cold snap and planted cold tolerant red and white snap dragons.
- Planted yellow snap dragons at the Constancia median at the intersection with Magnolia Point Boulevard.
- At the Magnolia Point sign, we washed the sign, cleaned out the dead purslane and replanted with multicolored snap dragons.
- Cleaned out the raised bed and other surrounding beds at the Magnolia Point entrance sign.
- Two of the three islands on the Constancia/RedHawk/Magnolia Point Boulevard were cleaned out.





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- Had the beds and hedgerows at the Magnolia Point entrance cleaned, debris removed and mulched.
- A vinyl wrap design that incorporates native pink muhly grass and hydrangeas in a natural setting was chosen by the Committee for the large electric utility box at Constancia and Magnolia Point Boulevard. It was presented to the Board for their approval at the November meeting and sent to the Green Cove Springs Electric Utility as well. The Committee has begun installation of ornamental native grasses around the adjacent smaller utility box to coordinate with the design.



Irrigation:

The new bluetooth irrigation system continues to operate well.

Next up:

- Replace the dying/dead jack frost ligustrum and other plants in the community owned property in front of Exit Realty.
- Installation of the vinyl wrap on the large electric utility box at the corner.
- Removal of 4 dead shrubs at end of hedgerow in front of the pond on Colonial and replacement with 4 coppertop viburnum.
- Trim and limb up trees that are encroaching on the roads throughout the community.
- Pruning the trees in the medians and sides of Magnolia Point Boulevard.
- Continue replacing the flowers in the beds at the Harbor Road sign and at the Medinah entrances.
- Continue our fall/winter planting along the shadow box fence on the entrance side of Magnolia Point Boulevard
- Installation of mulch on the recently renovated islands/medians at the Constancia /Red Hawk/Magnolia Point Boulevard intersection.
- Mulching the Medinah gate beds and possibly adding two holly trees.

DEC. 2025 Planting Tips:

Planting recommendations are pretty much the same as the November suggestions for our USDA growth zone (zone 9b): petunia, pansy, snapdragon, lobelia, alyssum, and viola add color and can be planted in zone 9b in winter. Certain shrubs, such as Camellias, Hollies, gardenias and pittosporum can be planted as well.

Cool weather herbs such as cilantro, dill, fennel, parsley, sage, and thyme and vegetables such as broccoli, cabbage, kale, and lettuce should do well. Lawns will be going into dormancy and do not require as much watering. Do not fertilize your lawn this month as the grass will not be able to use it.

It is recommended to place a luminary every three feet, allowing one kit to cover approximately 30 feet of street frontage. Many residents also choose to line their driveways for an even more spectacular display. For those who prefer, donations can

be made instead of purchasing kits. All donations directly benefit the scholarship fund.

The event also marks the beginning of the holiday season for Magnolia Point residents. In addition to the enchanting luminaria lighting, starting around 5:00 PM, the Magnolia Point Golf and Country Club will host a golf cart parade. 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This month's TRAVELING FORK offering is another recipe from the kitchen on board a cruise ship where I attended their cooking class with the Head Chef and his various assistants. There are several more of those recipes that will be brought to you by the TRAVELING FORK in the future. This one is for the dish, Baba Ganoush, which has Arabic origins and is found in most of the Mediterranean countries. This recipe yields four servings-metric to US conversions by the writer.

DIRECTIONS

Pierce the eggplant with a knife in several places. Place it on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Bake until it is very soft in a pre-heated oven at 375 degrees F for 25-30 minutes (until very tender).

Remove from the oven and let cool slightly; peel off and discard the skin. Place the eggplant flesh in a bowl. Using a food processor (with pulse button), mash the eggplant to a paste. Add the Tahini, garlic, lemon juice, and the cumin and mix well. Season to taste with salt, olive oil, and pepper. Add more Tahini and/or lemon juice if needed.

Prep time: 20 minutes; chill time: 2-24 hrs.; cook time: 1 1/2 hours, 30 mins; makes 4 servings. ENJOY!





*Bede Johnson's dad, Fred 'Stoney' Taylor, wrote the book. He was, to some after all, 'the world's greatest putter'. The book arrived in Bede's family home in 1968, and was titled, 'Three Hacks Plus One Putt Equals 4'.

Do you recall your dad writing the book? Dad wrote the book around 1965 while recovering from heart issues. Golf was a big part of my family I mostly remember hanging around our stone mill in Bradenton or his shop where he made clubs. One of my brothers also made clubs with him. We had access to all of his tools, shafts, heads, inserts and the like,





and as a kid it was so much fun for me to just be able to use all of his tools and machines. My kids still get a kick out of the fact that he used mercury to weight clubs and we always had that to play with.

What was life like in a "golfing household" then? Were there golf clubs in every corner, or was it more about the mindset and conversations around the game? Golf was a constant in our house growing up. I don't remember a day without golf every round was replayed at the dinner table. Often with guests like Tommy Bolt, Joe Horlyn, Henry Shakespeare were included. There were clubs, prototypes always. I am the only member of the family that did not play golf. I took it up after retirement.

Did your father test ideas from his book at home? For instance, were family members ever recruited to "test putts" in the living room or backyard? There was always someone putting, swinging a club inside and out or on a course. I swam competitively so I was in the pool until dinner. Then, many nights and weekends were spent at the club or on a course.





How did growing up with a father so passionate about golf influence your own relationship with the game?

I chose not to play as I beat one of my brothers in a contest when I was about 6 and my Dad was livid with him for not winning. How words affect you!

How did he share his enthusiasm for golf with others?

He was a very passionate man. Also an inventor, artistic and a visionary. Sarasota where I grew up was a melting pot of inventors, artists and writers. Dad worked on many projects, patents. So being around creatives was normal for us.

When you step onto the green today, do you ever think of him? What moment or image best sums up what golf meant to your family?

I do think of him, and my brothers sister and Mother. Golf still runs deep in our family. My nephew is a golf coach in Indiana. Those of us still here today all play.

Can you tell us what you remember about the connection with Gary Player in 1966 that you mentioned?

He had a relationship with Gary Player prior 1966. I was very young so I do not have a lot of memories. Dad made the woods he used to win the U.S. Open in 1965. I just remember him as always in black and just a genuine nice man. Dad created Marblehead Putters, and woods, later Taylormade and had a relationship with Henry Shakespeare.





*'Bede is a nickname that I have been called since birth. My brother David started it from the first time he saw me.

I never use my legal name. It is only used if I'm in some kind of trouble! If you called out my legal name,

I wouldn't even turn around.'

MIXMAGIC HOT CHOCOLATE EGGNOLIA

Ingredients (For 6 Servings)

For the Base:

- 3 cups (24 oz) whole milk
- 1 1/2 cups (12 oz) good quality, full-fat eggnog (premade)
- 6 tablespoons (or 1/4 cup + 2 tbsp) unsweetened cocoa powder (dark/Dutch-processed)
- 3 tablespoons granulated sugar (adjust to taste)
- 11/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Optional Spices (For deeper holiday flavor):

- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice or ground cloves

For Garnish:

- Whipped cream
- Freshly grated nutmeg
- Chocolate shavings or small marshmallows

Recipe

<u>Combine Dry Ingredients</u>: In a large saucepan or pot, whisk together the cocoa powder, sugar, salt, and any optional ground spices until well combined.

Make the Slurry: Pour in approximately 1/4 cup of the whole milk and whisk vigorously until a smooth, thick paste forms. Ensure there are no lumps of cocoa powder remaining.

Add Liquids: Pour in the remaining 2 3/4 cups of milk and the 1 1/2 cups of eggnog.

Heat Gently: Place the pot over medium-low heat. Stir frequently to prevent scorching on the bottom. Heat the mixture until it is steaming hot and small bubbles just begin to form around the edges. **Do not boil!** Finish: Remove the pot from the heat and stir in the vanilla extract. Taste and adjust for sweetness if needed. Serve immediately or keep warm.

Immediate Serving: Ladle the mixture into mugs. Keeping Warm: Transfer the finished beverage to a slow cooker (crockpot) set to the "Keep Warm" setting. This is ideal for a party, allowing guests to serve themselves. Stir occasionally.

Alcoholic Option

It's best to let your guests spike their own mugs to control strength and accommodate non-drinkers.

Set up a "Spike Station" next to the beverage pot with a a jigger or shot glass) and bottles of: Aged Rum,

Bourbon (or Whisky), Brandy (Optional)

Instruct guests to add 1.5 ounces of their preferred spirit to the mug before the hot *Eggnolia*.

Flavor Profile:

This drink is a rich, creamy, and spiced holiday indulgence. It balances the comforting bitterness of dark chocolate with the sweet, nutmeg-forward character of traditional eggnog. The steam milk adds light, airy texture, making it less heavy than pure eggnog but far richer than plain hot chocolate.

"Can we go on them?" His eyes widened.


"Sure, as soon as we inherit a small fortune," she giggled, to his delight.
